GROW YOUR OWN OPAL???????

In the book LAB GIRL, by Hope Jahren (winner of the National Book Critics Circle Award, published by Vintage Books, 2016), the geobiologist author reveals that she has discovered that hackberry (a tree) pits contain opal.
