UPCOMING EVENTS

February is our club swap and shop. See VP message for details March 8th, 9th, 10th! Gem Show at KCI Expo Center!

In addition to our March 8-10, 2019 KC gem and mineral show, please be aware of the large upcoming March 23-24, 2019 Cedar Rapids, Iowa annual show. This event, considered to be one of the best in the region, will have a theme this year entitled "Celebrating Geodes - Iowa's Mysterious State Rock". Additionally, this will serve as the site for the Rocky Mountain Federation and the American Federation Conventions. (Our club, by membership/association with the Rocky Mountain Federation is also a member of the parent American Federation of Mineralogical Societies, who rotates their participation annually - this year landing in Cedar Rapids). THAT WAS CLOSE KANSAS CITY!!!!

Were you aware that Kansas City came close to being struck by a meteorite? How close? The north and west edge of probable impact evidence is just 3 miles south of the Jackson County line, and 1 mile east of the KS/MO state line, in the very NW corner of Cass County, MO.

Known as the Belton Structure, and considered by many to be "a possible impact crater in Cass County, MO", this has been studied (at the 45th Lunar and Planetary Science Conference in 2014), and consensus, pending further study and investigation, is that it represents impact by a small to medium sized meteorite in about the late Pennsylvanian time (286 mya). The configuration consists of an elevated rim measuring about 5.5 km in diameter, and contains high angle normal faults encircling an inner area of 3.5 to 4 km in diameter. It also has a distinct annular basin surrounding the elevated center. New digital elevation modeling and studies of intense mechanical twinning in calcite along with recognition of signature faulting and folding help confirm the impact theory.

That being said, there remains (diminishing) consideration that the structure could be a collapsed karst (originally surmised by Kansas City's Dr. R. J. Gentile (author of "Rocks and Fossils of the Central United States, with Special Emphasis on the Kansas City Area) following earlier investigations of oil and gas in the region).

A meteorite strike of this size could have had significant impact/affect on urban KC and the region in today's time. As it turns out, it does affect present populations in that a new complex of schools and residences are currently being completed over and around this feature. And, our home sits on the very NE rim of the structure — necessitating 13 stabilizing piers being driven to firmament.

Additionally there is consideration (but as yet not as well understood or accepted) that there might have been another meteorite instance nearby - currently being labeled the "Edgerton (KS) Structure). This possible structure was recognized from hillshade maps and is thought to be Precambrian, if confirmed. (International Journal of Geophysics reference).
