NEWS, VIEWS AND REVIEWS

Club Gold Panners — and Malachite — and Linda Hall Library

For those gold panners in the club, the current (Jan. 2020) Rock & Gem magazine is featuring the first of a three-part series on gold by Bob Jones. Part I entitled" Famous Gold, Exploring the Harvard Collection" is the current piece, followed by Part II in the Feb, issue (Australian discovery), and part III in the March issue (Denver Museum collections). Of particular interest is the reference to the crystallized gold which was collected from the "Wire Patch" on Farncomb Hill, Breckenridge, Colorado (this being on exhibit in Denver). Also, there is suggestion that some of the "Father's Day" gold from Australia may be exhibited this year at the Tucson Gem and Mineral show in Feb. 2020.

As for Malachite, the current issue of Rock & Gem has a related article (also by Bob Jones) and has photograph of a Russian created malachite vase (a tazza which is defined as a shallow cup or vase on a pedestal). This brings to mind the Kansas City Linda Hall Library tazza (see a previous club Bulletin), which all members should strive to see. The Linda Hall version (approximately 6' tall) has a long generally accepted history. It is believed that it was sculpted in Russia before 1850 and was in place at the London Crystal Palace Exhibition in 1851. Fast forward to 1910 when August Heckscher, a German/American businessman and philanthropist, visited Russia in 1910 and had an audience with Czar Nicholas II, at which time the Czar gave Heckscher a monumental tazza (believed to be the same tazza). In 1920 the Heckscher Museum of Art was established in his adopted home town of Huntington, Long Island, New York. The tazza most likely resided in Mr. Heckscher's home and/or in the Museum. At some point the tazza was removed from the control of the Hechscher estate and/or the Museum control and was discovered by Ms. Hellen Spenser for sale probably in California. Ms. Spenser purchased the tazza and donated it to the Linda Hall Library where it resides to this day, a true treasure.

How it left Long Island is currently unknown, however the Heckscher Museum as recent as 2008 was embroiled in community controversy when it was discovered they were attempting to sell some of their holdings (including the famous 1926 "Eclipse of the Sun" painting by George Grosz. Caught in the act by outraged art lovers, the Museum reversed the process and the painting, as well as other valuable items, remains in the Museum as if nothing ever happened. It is not revealed if the tazza (and/or other unidentified items) was the victim of suspicious disposal. Such as it is the tazza is a welcome addition to the KC area.
