Rocky Mountain Federation News

Just recently revealed and/or understood. The RMF was the only one of the seven federations to hold their annual Congress in 2020. Now it is understood that while the Congress went forward, because of a lack of quorum, no official business could be conducted. This year, now in conjunction with the parent American Federation (who rotates their participation every seven years), the 2021 Congress is expected to reach a quorum and act on a combined 2020 and 2021 agenda. This 2021 Congress is expected to be fully attended in Big Piney, WY. (The 2020 Congress was also in Big Piney and returns there after the scheduled 2021 Congress in Sandy, Utah has to be moved due to virus concerns).

The 2022 Congress is scheduled to occur (date TBD) in Las Vegas, NV (which is outside RMF boundary - but that's another interesting story which will be explained in a later Bulletin).

Traditionally at each Congress, memorials are offered by each club regarding members who have passed away during the past year. OGMS lost long time member Tom Lorenz just before the 2020 session was to occur. As such his memorial was not presented and entered into the record at that time (due to lack of a quorum), but will be presented and entered at the 2021 session, ironically on June 19th, the same day his memorial service will occur in Overland Park, KS.

From the Library

The RMF directory indicates that copies of their By Laws, Operating Procedures and Articles of Incorporation should be in each club's library. Interesting recent reads (thanks to virus restriction time outs).

(Note: These following books are not a part of the original OGMS library, but are available on loan).

<u>The Lost City of the Monkey God</u>. (#1 New York Times Bestseller). Douglas Preston, 2017. A search (and locating) of a lost city in the Honduran interior. While the exploration itself is spellbinding, for the rockhound, the explanation of an unknown (but now spreading) parasitic tropical disease known as leishmaniasis (leish for short) is of concern and should be watched for. Turns out while this disease is

not new to the tropics, global warming is helping it's spread by sand flies and animals and is seen expanding throughout Texas and Oklahoma as warm temperatures escalate annually. The symptoms are non-healing lesions, stiffness in legs and joints, some fevers — and should not be ignored. (As a side note, rock hounds should take precautions sorting through old collections of rocks, etc. Many such collections contain rodent droppings which could be the source of various types of fevers).

<u>Dry Storeroom No. 1. The Secret Life of the Natural History Museum</u>. Richard Fortey, 2008. An inside account of the Natural History Museum in London. This exceptional museum stretches back to before Darwin and gives a close look as to the very unique figures who make up such a scientific enterprise. And, it reveals that such an establishment is very much more than collections, but is on the cutting edge of science - and very much a victim of budgets. Cited are efforts/relationships with "that most distinguished of United States conservation bodies, the Missouri Botanic Garden", the U. of Tennessee Department of Anthropology, and the U. of Kansas Treatise on Invertebrate Paleontology.

<u>Gem Hunter's Guide</u>. Russell P. Macfall, 1963. (This book was obtained at the recent Stilwell, KS estate). An interesting book including many of the old sites in the U.S, Canada and Mexico, many of which are depleted, but also many that are forgotten.

In Cass County, MO mention is made of petrified wood being found in a quarry at Cornett. In Wyandotte County, KS mention is made of geodes in the Lone Star quarry at Bonner Springs. (This closed quarry is believed to now be owned by Hamm Quarries, and attempts to access it will be made).

The Geology of Jackson County (MO). Missouri Bureau of Geology and Mines, 1917. (This book was discovered at an antique shop). While specific to Jackson County, MO, this book is a good look at the fossil to be found in quarries in adjacent counties on both sides of the state line. It also specifically identifies sites in KC, which due to development, are difficult to recognize, but in some cases are still relevant to collecting if access can be realized.

Larry Wells found the following agate slab at an estate sale. Notice the tornado in the middle of the slab. After some investigation, Josh Foster believes it is a "flame" seam agate. Pretty cool oddity.



DNA Jewelry; Cabochon made with Breast Milk

Vinca jewelry store on the plaza contacted OGMS member Vince Martini and indicated one of their best clients had recently viewed a website that makes DNA jewelry using breast milk and asked if he could make a 6mm cabochon gemstone with their client's breastmilk in it. Vince told them no, but to call me because I am a registered nurse and a lapidarist. I reviewed the "JoBri Breast Milk Charms" website and thought of a possible way to do this using 330 epoxy. Vinca gave me a bottle of breast milk from their

refrigerator which I dehydrated into a powder and mixed it into the 330 epoxy with a tiny amount of white pigment because the client had requested that the cabochon not be yellow. The epoxy was heated to lower its viscosity and release any air bubbles. It was then poured into a plastic tube with a 6 mm inside diameter. After it hardened, I removed it from the mold and placed it under a heat lamp for two hours.

I polished the end of the tube with a cerium oxide paste - but was unable to achieve a good polish - so I taped the sides and put Paleo Bond PB002 penetrant stabilizer on the end and then gently wiped it off with a soft 100% cotton cloth. The next day I polished the end again with a CO paste and successfully achieved a good polish. I told Vinca to give their client a good jewelry polishing cloth to use whenever the gemstone became dull. I read on the "JoBri" website they were sending a polishing cloth with their jewelry.

While I was fabricating the breastmilk gemstone Vince Martini was making the ring. Vince set the cabochon in the ring and delivered it with the leftover breastmilk and the 6mm breastmilk tube which could be used to make matching earrings, pendant, or a bracelet in the future. - Larry Wells
