PRESIDENTS MESSAGE:

Thanks to all who participated in the shop and swap session at our Feb. club meeting. Weather threats obviously played a part in our attendance and numbers were down from the session we had last year (and it is recognized that some members were at the Tucson Gem and Mineral Show). There are ideas being discussed as to how to boost participation in this event (including changing the date) in the future, as it has been touted as being one of our most popular sessions. Thoughts and comments are welcome as we consider and plan for this.

My Tucson Trip

(Bad News/Good News). First the bad news. For a rock collector, the disgrace is to be attacked by a rock (obviously a "leaverite"). Actually, my car was attacked by a large rock thrown from the rear of a rock hauling dual gondola truck. As luck would have it, the boulder went under the car (rather than through the windshield), which resulted in significant oil pan and emissions damage. Fortunately, Phoenix was nearby and after limping into the dealer, was provided exceptional over the weekend service. The good news here was that this allowed me to spend a couple of un-scheduled days in Phoenix, one of which allowed me to leisurely re-visit the Heard Museum which has long been on my bucket list. For those traveling to/through Phoenix I strongly suggest taking the time to visit the Heard Museum, which is nationally known as being the premier Native American Indian museum, but also exhibiting the most outstanding and extensive collection of historical and hand fabricated turquoise and silver jewelry in the country. (It also has most of the Fred Harvey collection of basketry).

A little collateral and trivia information realized from the museum visit is that 28% of Arizona is tribal land, that there are 22 sovereign tribal nations here, and that the Navajo (Dine') is the largest nation (over 275,000 enrolled members) on the largest reservation which is larger than 10 of the 50 U.S. states. (Actually, the Navajo reservation, while being primarily in AZ also includes parts of adjacent Utah and NM). As for Tucson, the annual show continues to be the world's draw for the gem and mineral population, and the four-day exhibition at the convention center is unsurpassed for bringing together the best specimens, presentations, vendors, etc. This year's theme was "World Class Minerals" and featured displays from the Smithsonian Institute, the Natural History Museum of Vienna, GIA, Harvard, American Museum of Natural History, Carnegie, Geological Museum of China, National Museum of Scotland, the Perot Museum of Nature and Science, Royal Ontario Museum, Yale, and many others. Also, there were 45 expert speakers/presentations over the four-day event, and throughout the city (the first two weeks of Feb.) were vendors at 47 different venues. In all over 20,000 visitors were expected this year. (In 2021 the theme will be around "the 50th anniversary of the Fluorescent Mineral Society with the most spectacular exhibition of minerals that glow under ultraviolet light").

Can't get enough of Tucson? (or is it too big)? Patrons might consider visiting Quartzite, AZ during Jan. of each year where it is estimated that over a million "snowbirds" visit all of the vendors (prior to them moving to Tucson for the annual show). Some of our club members participate in this instead of the Tucson main attraction. And, if that is insufficient, individuals might consider the Denver show(s) which is evolving/building to challenge the tradition of Tucson. This year the Colorado Mineral and Fossil Shows are (spring) April 10-12, 2020, and (fall) Sept. 11-19, 2020.

Queen Nefertari (For Whom the Sun Shines) is in town.

Recognize that the Queen Nefertari exhibit is at the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art through only March 29, 2020. This exhibit, accompanied by 230 works of historic art, features the Queen (the Great Royal Spouse of Ramesses II during the 19th Dynasty) and items from the Egyptian tomb, as well as from around the historic region. As the tomb had been looted, as so many where, many of the artifacts have been assembled from worldwide collections through the organization of Museo Egizio, Turin, and StArt in collaboration with The Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, Pointe-a-Calliere, Montreal Archaeology and History Complex, and National Geographic Society.

In the dark of night.

Regrettably, a police report revealed that the Hawthorne Plaza Overland Park Tivol jewelry store was burglarized before 4 am Thursday, Jan. 23, 2020. Burglars apparently forced entry through a side window and escaped while scattering jewelry across the parking lot in their haste. It has not been established or revealed how much was stolen, and to date no further information is available. (In 2001, four men were convicted of robbing and fencing more than \$2.5 million in jewelry taken from the Tivol store on the Country Club Plaza in 1997). (Source: KC Star; 1/24/20).

What is the first mineral to be named for a person?

(Answer: **Prehnite**. Named for Colonel Hendrick Prehn (who called himself von Hendrik). In S. Africa, he discovered a new silicate and aluminum mineral, since named Prehnite in 1788. It was the first to be named and described from S. Africa, and also the first to be named for a person. Prehnite can be found in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and on Isle Royale in Lake Superior.)
