Association March Show Notes

The March 11-13, 2022 KC Gem and Mineral Show was by all early indications one of the best, (and most probably was the best), attended show in the 60-year history. This in spite of a late winter storm affecting everyone on Friday and Saturday. As is typical of our region, Sunday reversed itself overnight and acted like early spring. The Association will hold its next Board meeting on April 14 at which time the final results of the show will be revealed.

At the risk of being embarrassed by missing someone, we instead wish to blanket thank all of the OGMS members who volunteered and participated in this show over the five set up and actual show days. A show of this size could not be successful without the help and dedication of each of the seven organizations and their enthusiastic members making up the Association. As the largest club of the seven, OGMS continues to strongly contribute in terms of energy and effort. Thanks again for making this such a success.

Our club placed 16 display cases at this show. As previously mentioned, each club is awarded a financial stipend (usually about \$20-\$25) for each case entered. This is a welcome infusion to our operating budget, and thank you to those members who once again participated in this manner. Thanks also to

Barbara Crompton, Mike McClurg, and Ann and Mandy Lorenz for lending their display cases to other club members for the show. And now thank you again to Ann and Mandy Lorenz who have decided to donate their two cases to the club for future use (in memory of Tom Lorenz).

Related to the weather: fortunately, only two exhibitors (one from Santa Fe, NM and the other from south central KS) had to cancel, and only one vendor canceled. The exhibitor from Kansas was Bill Smith, who OGMS members may recall presented his crafted butterflies at one of our club meetings a couple of years ago. Bill, at this show, was to have exhibited his award-winning collections of Kansas moss opal cabs as well as Victoria Stone specimens. He indicates he will plan to be at the 2023 show with his collections and is developing a third special exhibit to bring along. (As a side note, Bill and his wife have a small gem and mineral museum adjacent to their home in Harper, Kansas. and would welcome OGMS visitors passing through the area - and it's practically on the way to selenite collecting in Jet, OK).

Of this show special exhibits, the OGMS was involved in the contents of three special display cases. The first containing the Tibetan jeweled prayer wheels and turquoise (the estate of Dr. McReynolds of Warrensburg, MO) and three carved oriental pieces (from Larry Wells) received numerous comments as to the history and use of the wheels. The second case contained several unusually large thundereggs personally collected and face polished by OGMS member Ed Hartl. And the third case contained Mozarkite items designed and produced by Bob Harms. All of the Mozarkite came from the Harms family Cole Camp, MO site that the OGMS members collect on exclusively each year.

Oak Park Mall Sightings

In spite of COVID, have you been to the Oak Park Mall recently? First of all, there is a gem and mineral kiosk on the main level owned and operated by OGMS members Lee Mader and Vicky Ritter. They are also in the process of opening a store front shop on the upper level (on the link between the food court area and Nordstroms), that will include gems and minerals as well as a related museum. The name of the kiosk and store/museum is "Crystals and More". You'll be surprised at the quality and variety of items displayed.

Also in the mall, just around the corner from Crystals and More, is "Custom Tees". This shop, unaffiliated with Lee and Vicky, was recently visited by OGMS members Steve and Laura Woltman at which time they had the vendor digitally capture the OGMS logo. Arm Chair Prospecting

Mona Lisa Turquoise/Arkansas

While searching for a gem and mineral club in Arkansas for a friend, the Google quest took a turn to the NW Arkansas Gem & Mineral Society (which while not in the area of the Rocky Mountain Federation, still functions as such). Their website is interesting in that it lists the club field trip activities — which interestingly includes a piece several years ago about collecting turquoise in of all places — ARKANSAS! It turns out there have been several turquoise mines in Arkansas, primarily in Polk (and lessor so in Gilham) County. Of the five listed mines, the 8.74-acre Mona Lisa mine (now closed) gets the most attention and in fact is the popular name given to turquoise from the area. Ownership and use

is overseen by the Bureau of Land Management in the Jackson, Arkansas field office under serial number ESMC 12164. While the mine is closed it still appears the local club occasionally has collecting rights, and may be worth contacting them if you are on your way to collect quartz crystals or diamonds in nearby counties.

Treating Gems and Minerals

It has long been considered inappropriate to treat (heating, dying, etc.) gems and minerals, and in fact many will not purchase or have in their collections any specimens that have been artificially altered. But over time treating certain specimens has become understood and accepted, thus making a worthless and colorless specimen into a more marketable form. This has been true in the case, and readily advertised, for Montana sapphires which are routinely sent overseas to be heated resulting in the skyblue coloration so desired. And it has been the case for topaz which in a breakthrough was developed by Charles Lock Key and his partner in 1970. From his obituary (1935 - 2021) it has been described that "he began experimenting with ways to turn worthless colorless topaz into a more marketable form. Gamma radiation had a modest but insufficient effect on the color, so he scouted about for other possible treatments. The breakthrough came when he placed topaz crystals in an electron accelerator, and the crystals turned a dark brown color. Further experimentation showed that heat-treating the brown crystals caused them to turn a deep and vibrant blue. The color was permanent and was distributed evenly throughout the crystals. The colorless topaz was purchased for around \$10/kilogram, and after treatment was sold for \$7,500/kilogram - a 750-fold mark-up. Soon they were selling over a million dollars in treated topaz (40,000 carats at \$30 - \$35/carat) every month." Quite a success story, and readily accepted. (The Mineralogical Record; March-April 2022. Vol. 53; No. 2).
