FLASHBACK - - March 2023 Program on Pearls

At our March 2, 2023 OGMS club meeting, Tom Tivol exhibited suburb examples and gave an excellent and in-depth program on pearls and related jewelry. Now, in the June 2023 issue of Rock & Gem magazine, freelance writer Audrey Pavia presents "Pearls: Tears of a Mermaid" as an overview of the subject. While she does not explain the "tears of a mermaid" statement origin, a sidebar to the article offers readers the opportunity to access for free (stated normally \$599) the comprehensive "Pearl-As-One" course by the Cultured Pearl Association of America (CPAA). Interested individuals are directed to go to pearlsasone.com and use the coupon code ROCKNGEM. This course is cited as giving information on the history, production and business of pearls. The offer does not designate that one has to be a current subscriber to Rock & Gem. The magazine is the official publication of the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies (AFMS), which by membership through the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies (RMFMS), OGMS is a member. It will be interesting to learn from OGMS members their opinion of the course (in a future Bulletin).

FLASHBACK - - May. 2023 Program by Kathleen Rust

It has been learned that our May 2023 presenter, Kathleen Rust, has earned the Cynthia Reiss-Clark Writing Award from the KU Department of English. This award is given to individuals in STEM fields whose writing about science and technology "clearly, effectively, and gracefully makes scientific topics accessible to wider audiences." The award was given for her article titled: "The Story of Ekgmowechashala - what a 29.5-million-year-old primate can teach us about animal responses to climate change". The article described research she has been conducting on an enigmatic primate species from the late Oligocene of North America called Ekgmowechashala. Along with her mentor, Dr. Christopher Beard, KU Distinguished Professor and curator of the Division of Vertebrate Paleontology, she has also recently submitted a fuller, detailed research paper on this work to a scientific journal.

Ms. Rust and Dr. Beard have both been given financial scholarship/research awards from The Association of Earth Science Clubs of Greater Kansas City, Inc. at our March 2023 gem and mineral show. These awards, as identified in the May Rock Solid Bulletin are from the Association scholarship fund.

NEWS, VIEWS AND REVIEWS

SILVISAURUS Designated Official State (KS) and Fossil

The only dinosaur known to have lived in what is now Kansas, Silvisaurus condrayi, was designated the official state land fossil of Kansas, thanks in part to a Kansas rancher and a Goddard schoolteacher and his sixth-grade students. Teacher Joel Condray, his students from Challenger Intermediate School in Goddard, as well as David Burnham, University of Kansas fossil preparator, provided testimony for the bill, SB-3. The bill was sponsored by State Sen. Elaine Bowers, R-Concordia, and signed by into law by Kansas Gov. Laura Kelly on April 7.

Condray is the grandson of Warren Condray, a Kansas rancher who found the fossil skeleton on his Ottawa County land in 1955 and donated it to the KU Natural History Museum's vertebrate paleontology collection. In 1960, the fossil was described as a new species of dinosaur by KU paleontology researcher Theodore Eaton and named Silvisaurus condrayi, in honor of the Kansas rancher.

The only known skeletal specimen of Silvisaurus to date is housed at the KU Natural History Museum, a

part of the KU Biodiversity Institute, which studies past and present biological diversity. The dinosaur's fossil remains include the skull, lower jaw, backbone, ribs, limb bones, armor-like plates and a large shoulder spike, and they have been studied by researchers around the globe. Several



years ago, new technologies emerged that helped KU paleontologists obtain more of the specimen from the rock in which it was embedded, and a new museum display was created for it in 2018. The exhibition can be seen at the museum, along with a large scientific illustration depicting a Silvisaurus walking.

Silvisaurus is on display at the museum, as is the state flying fossil, Pteranodon, and the state marine fossil, Tylosaurus. A full-sized poster of Silvisaurus is on display in the KC Union Station Science City Dino Lab.

"We owe a debt of gratitude to Warren Condray for bringing his discovery to our attention, and all Kansans can be proud that this rare find is unique to our state," Burnham said.
