Our club participated in all elements of the show from set ups on Wednesday and Thursday, to assisting in each of the three-day activities, and placing of individual displays - - of which our club had 20 cases (about what we normally have). Geoscience Academy and OGMS

This past week the 73rd Greater Kansas City Science & Engineering Fair was held at Union Station in Kansas City. As it has become typical, the Geoscience Academy (of the Olathe Public Schools) played a major role in this event and were highly successful in placing 29 projects (out of 96 projects representing 63 schools entered at the Senior level) in the competition - - and most of these won upper-level awards. It is noted that the Geoscience Academy, (lead primarily by Marsha Skoczek), while listed in the fair directory as Olathe North High School, is in fact the combination of all of the Olathe High Schools participating in the Academy.

OGMS has been a supporter of the Academy, having donated to their program (as has the Association of Earth Science Clubs of Greater Kansas City), and we have been fortunate to have had graduates and current students of the Academy present programs to our club. To that end, at our May 2, 2024 club meeting, Quinton Mindrup (an OGMS member and former Olathe HS/Academy graduate) will be presenting on a topic related to copper. Quinton, a K-State student, spoke to our group once before about his work in the Baja Peninsula of Mexico and is the first recipient of the Tom Lorenz academic scholarship two years ago. (Tom was a long-time member of OGMS).

Membership Dues/April Meeting Vote

Related to membership dues, the OGMS Board in a recent meeting, decided to review the dues structure for the club - - this based upon the clear recognition of elevating costs for such as meeting room rental, refreshments, web site fees, T shirts, postage, Rocky Mountain Federation insurance coverage, Diamond Dan subscription, etc. While the financial status of the club is positive, elevating

costs play a role and to that end the Board has determined to propose raising the adult dues from \$10 per year to \$15 per year (dues for children are to remain at \$5 per year). In accordance with club Bylaws this dues change must be presented to members at a club meeting for discussion and voting. In a recent inventory of a specimen collection, there was found a packet labeled "African Turquoise". Using Google, it was found that this material, marketed in the 1970's, was actually not treated turquoise

but was ground and dyed jasper, a type of chalcedony similar to agate. Buyer beware. In the same collection numerous cabs and carvings of "jade" were found. Some were clearly labeled Burmese Jadeite while others were labeled only jade, "New" jade and/or Korean jade. Those identified as Burmese jadeite it was felt should be considered as being truly jadeite, while the others should be considered nephrite, unless tested and otherwise confirmed as jadeite.

Bob Harms (we have collected Mozarkite from his property near Lincoln, MO) recently sent information that he has purchased a small concrete mixer from Harbor Freight and is using the devise for the early stages of tumbling Mozarkite and is pleased with the results - - with the understanding that a final finish/polish will require more traditional equipment. In the concrete mixer he is able to tumble larger loads faster than had been previously possible. Mr.


NEWS, VIEWS AND REVIEWS

Book Rescue

You've no doubt heard of shelter rescue pets. How about rescue books from Half Priced Bookstore? An OGMS member recently found (and rescued for only \$2) Dana's Manual of Mineralogy, a 1944 publication which was in fact the 15th revision of the James Dwight Dana manuals begun in 1857. This particular book, obviously well used with numerous underlines and penciled margin notes throughout the volume, was of particular interest in that it was published near the end of WWII, and represented war effort restrictions (confirmed via the



statement from the frontispiece page in which the "conservation of paper and other important war materials" was of concern - and the ribbon carried by the



eagle on which the message "Books are weapons in the war of ideas" is apparent).

While this is a text primarily concerning minerals, there were some brief explanations to the formation of land masses, rock formations, etc. - - but no mention or suggestion of plate tectonics or continental drift, etc. These ideas developed in the first portion of the 20th century; however, the concept was not to be accepted and validated until the mid-t-late 1960s.
